
WISE (Wellness In Senior Education)

Senior program serves 25 people

164 social hours provided to seniors in 2022-23. They met 41 times, averaging 4 hours per visit.

10% reduction in weekly alone time for WISE seniors (The national average of weekly alone time spent by individuals 60 or older is 7 hours and 22 minutes*.)

Wesley House summer and afterschool programs have made an impact on Daquan, who has been participating since kindergarten.

"Wesley House is a great place for kids. We do a lot of fun things, especially during the summer, that most kids don't get to do."

While Girl Scout Camp and Dollywood are two of his favorite experiences, it's the Wesley House team who have made the biggest impression.

"I like the counselors and staff. Everyone is nice and positive. They are not negative."

The food pantry is a true blessing. They have great attitudes, and they treat you with respect. They have compassion for the people who come to the pantry.

I like the friends I've made and the network I've created here. We treat people with kindness here. I've worked at many places and here we have each other's backs - you can't always say that about your work.

Why do you think people come to Wesley House?

We treat people the way we want to be treated, and that's all that counts.


Road To Licensure
